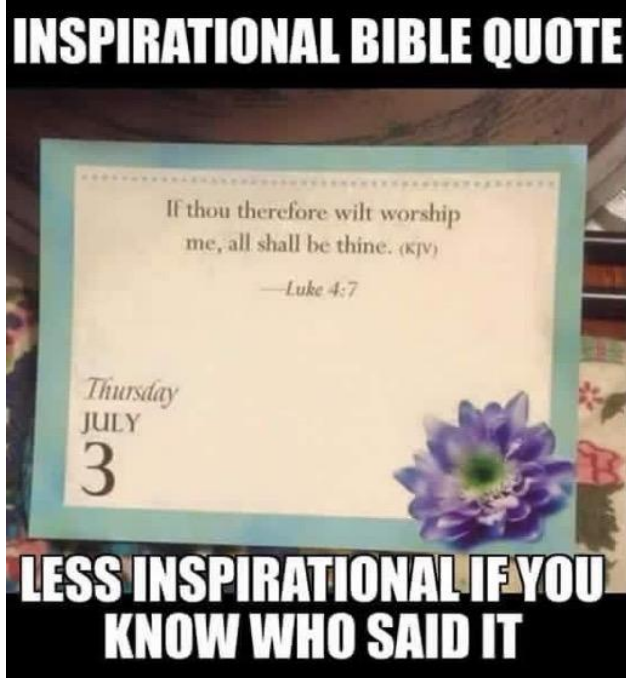
A Note from Dean Tim

Almighty God, whose blessed Son was led by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan: Come quickly to help us who are assaulted by many temptations; and, as you know the weaknesses of each of us, let each one find you mighty to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Collect for Lent 1, BCP pg. 218)

This Sunday we recount Jesus' own temptation in the Jordanian wilderness, the barren and sun-blasted desert of the Holy Land. Henri Nouwen wrote, "The lives of Jesus' disciples clearly show that suffering does not diminish because of conversion. Sometimes it even becomes more intense. But our attention is no longer directed to the 'more or less.' What matters is to listen attentively to the Spirit and to go obediently where we are being led, whether to a joyful or a painful place."

As disciples we can wish that our choice to follow Jesus would prevent sorrows and temptations. Yet, we cannot hope for greater than what our own Lord faced. Temptation is a part of the human condition and even Jesus faced it. How we respond to where our passions lead us is important. The most interesting part of Jesus' temptations in Luke, for me, is how the devil proof texts from scripture to justify his pushing Jesus to break faith with his father. Each time, Jesus replies in turn with better, more contextual, quotes that reflect the first commandment to Love God and disavow all idols, particularly when that idol is what we think we deserve. *In the end it's not being able to quote Scripture that matters, it is your formed ability to live into the life to which Scripture calls us: Love God, Love Your Neighbor.*

To underscore my point, here's my favorite example of *really* missing the mark on this, from the very gospel selection we will reflect upon on Sunday:



(Cliff Notes: it was Satan speaking here... not God)

Discipleship in community matters. Someone at that publisher should have been able to speak up and let the company know this was a *major* self-own. When we delve into Scripture and theological discussion with one another we avoid falling into echo chambers of our own desires. Tertullian, an early church leader in Carthage, once wrote the "One Christian is no Christian." When there is no one to challenge or correct our assumptions, it can lead to terrible consequences and self-dealing beliefs. Most of the current problems we face as a world and a nation are the direct result of such limited thinking. If you don't feel something is right, think about why and speak up. It's the best way to avoid groupthink and its often-destructive results.

Being knowledgeable and open to discussion with one another will improve our understanding and can quite literally save the world.

Have a blessed Lent.

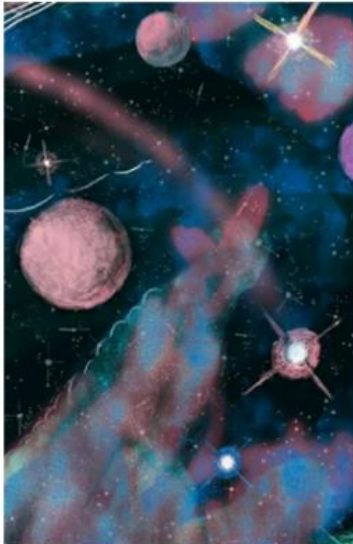
Children, Youth, and Family Ministry at Trinity

Vestry Update Margaret Brown, Senior Warden

The 2025 vestry met for its first meeting on February 18. The new members were welcomed and included Josette Dornoff, Katherine Mahannah, Gary Warren, Nan Marie Wollam, Rebecca Dixon, and Josie Flocchini (youth representative).

The first item of discussion was the results of the hearing loss and technology survey conducted by vestry member Aaron Koning. Those who participated prefer a Bluetooth-enabled system that would operate through their hearing aids and be controllable on their phones. Aaron will research systems and pricing.

The vestry approved up to \$8,000 to be expended from vestry-restricted funds on the installation, including plumbing, of the two water fountains to be located in the church. The bid from Savage and Sons was approximately \$13,000, \$6,000 for equipment, and around \$7,000 for installation. The cost of equipment will come out of the yearly endowment allocation. We anticipate work to begin in several months. Thanks to Lisa Otterson for spearheading this project.

The Columbarium committee recommended a price increase for niches, stating that Trinity is currently far below market price. The vestry approved the following prices: (Members) \$1,500 for a small niche, \$3,000 for a large niche. Non-member prices will be \$5,000 for a small niche and \$10,000 for a large niche. The pricing differential favors members, and Dean Tim will screen non-members who apply.

The vestry also approved \$9,000 for the printing of the book about Trinity's stained glass windows by Karen Henke. Proceeds from the sale of the books will go to support the repair and maintenance of the windows.

A major emphasis for the 2025 vestry will be welcoming all who come to Trinity and sharing our many ministries. Ann Morgan will be chairing a committee that will be formed in the near future.

Carol Roman and Lindsay Campbell, treasurers, reported that we remain in a sound financial position.

The next meeting of the vestry will be Tuesday, March 18, at 6 p.m. in the Parish Hall conference room.

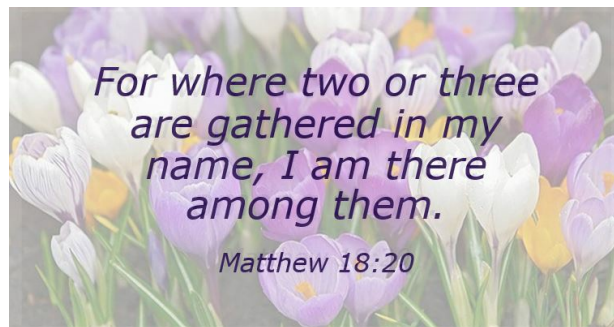
Divinely Fine Women March Lunch

The Lessons Appointed for Use on the First Sunday in Lent



The Collect

Almighty God, whose blessed Son was led by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan: Come quickly to help us who are assaulted by many temptations; and, as you know the weaknesses of each of us, let each one find you mighty to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

The Lesson: Deuteronomy (26:1-11)

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us." When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, we cried to the

Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me." You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

The Response: Psalm 91:1-2, 9-16

1 He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High, *
abides under the shadow of the Almighty.

2 He shall say to the Lord,
"You are my refuge and my stronghold, *
my God in whom I put my trust."

9 Because you have made the Lord your refuge, *
and the Most High your habitation,

10 There shall no evil happen to you, *
neither shall any plague come near your dwelling.

11 For he shall give his angels charge over you, *
to keep you in all your ways.

12 They shall bear you in their hands, *
lest you dash your foot against a stone.

13 You shall tread upon the lion and adder; *
you shall trample the young lion and the serpent under your feet.

14 Because he is bound to me in love,
therefore will I deliver him; *
I will protect him, because he knows my Name.

15 He shall call upon me, and I will answer him; *
I am with him in trouble;
I will rescue him and bring him to honor.

16 With long life will I satisfy him, *
and show him my salvation.

The Epistle: Romans (10:8b-13)

"The word is near you,
on your lips and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

The Gospel: Luke 4:1-13

After his baptism, Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'"

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written,

"Worship the Lord your God,
and serve only him.'"

Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written,

'He will command his angels concerning you,
to protect you,'

and

'On their hands they will bear you up,
so that you will not dash your foot against a stone.'"

Jesus answered him, "It is said, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'" When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.
