A Note from Dean Tim

"Then all return to the city direct to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher and Morning Prayer takes place according to custom." (Diary of Egeria, 4^{th} C.)

Between 381 and 384 AD, a Galician woman (perhaps a nun) named Egeria made a remarkable journey, by foot, from Spain to the Holy Land to participate in the services of the Church in Jerusalem. She wrote and published a diary, the earliest and most complete description the early church's liturgical celebration of Holy Week. Her pilgrimage provides the structure for Holy Week services as we still observe them. Unchanged from her time, these services allow us to walk with our Lord as he journeys through his last week of life, his death, and his resurrection. The following are bits of history combined with Egeria's reflections, recorded by Dr. Marian Hatchett in his Commentary on the American Prayer Book. This Holy Week, I encourage you to reflect on these services, to join in their celebration, and to make Jesus' steps your own.

Egeria tells us Maundy Thursday was celebrated by reading an account of the Last Supper and the celebration of the Eucharist. Very soon after Egeria's time, the story of Jesus' washing of the feet of his disciples was added, and it became tradition for abbots and bishops to wash the feet of peasants and of kings during this service. The name "Maundy Thursday" comes from the word "maundatum" or "commandment" from Jesus' words at the Last Supper: "A new commandment I give you, that you love one another as I have loved you." Does the idea of foot washing make you nervous? It's meant to. It is a graphic illustration of the intimacy of service that Jesus demonstrated to us. From the very beginning, this liturgy also included the stripping of the altar, in preparation for Good Friday. We will strip the altar after the customary Maundy Thursday service, beginning at 6pm.

Customarily, the Maundy Thursday liturgy was also followed by a "Watch," in which people maintained a vigil of prayer following Jesus' request in the garden of Gethsemane, "could you not watch with me for one hour?" To those who might choose to stay home this Maundy Thursday evening, his question is a powerful one indeed. Please come and spend an hour sometime overnight in the church. The watch begins after we strip the altar and chancel. It lasts through the night until sunrise. It is a profound time to spend in prayer and in the presence of Jesus in the reserved sacrament upon an altar of repose in a beautiful floral "Garden of Gethsemane", in our Holy Innocents' Columbarium Chapel.

Egeria's fourth century description of Good Friday is the first we have of this service, which focuses solely on the cross and Christ. "From eight o'clock until noon," she writes, "the wood of the true cross was exposed at the sight of the crucifixion. There the faithful came to venerate them. At noon, they moved into the church for a service of psalms, lections, hymns, and prayers, which lasted until three." The early rites from this same period include special solemn collects and hymns which have been incorporated into our own liturgy. In this case "Good" derives its meaning from the middle English usage of "goode" as "holy." On Good Friday we remember our Lord's passion with holy prayer and veneration of the Cross. Good Friday services are at Noon and 6pm, we will also observe the Stations of the Cross at 3pm, the hour of Jesus' death.

The Jewish Passover commemorated the slaying of the Egyptian first born, the exodus from Egypt, and the entry of the children of Israel into the promised land. From the time of the Early Church, Jesus Christ has been understood to be the fulfillment of the old feast. In every language except English, the same word is used for the Jewish Passover and Christian Easter — Pascha. Reinterpreted with New Testament themes, this service became the Easter Vigil — a service that retraces the salvation history of humankind, from darkness to light, from sin to life, from death to resurrection in Jesus Christ. This service has been known as the principal celebration of Easter beginning at least a hundred years before Egeria. From very ancient times it has been held as the appropriate time of baptism for adults. Candlelit and full of chanting and marvelous symbolism, the Vigil is the most profound service of the Christian year. Except the for Eucharist itself, it is the closest example we have to the worship of the early church. Like Christmas Eve is the first service of Christmas, the Vigil is the first service of Easter. And, like Christmas Eve, it is a service not to miss. The Vigil will be held at Trinity beginning at astronomical sunset, which is 7:42pm this year. St. Paul's, St. Catherine's, and St. Peter's have all been invited to join us at the cathedral. It's going to be great!

Services on Easter Day will be at the customary times: 7:30am for Rite I and 9am for the Family Service. An Easter Egg Hunt for children follows the 9am service in the Church Yard. At 11am, the Festive Rite II Choral Eucharist including Brass caps the liturgical celebrations of Christ's resurrection.

I hope you will take time to join with your fellow Trinitarians throughout Holy Week, journeying with Egeria in Jesus' footsteps. Her travels along the road of faith changed her life and still have a profound impact on our life and worship more than 1600 years later. On her pilgrimage, she met Jesus. Through Jesus' story, she discovered her own purpose. Through his death and resurrection, she received the promise of her own resurrection. This Holy Week and Easter, I pray that, in your own life's pilgrimage, you may discover all these same things for yourself.

At a meeting of the Vestry on April 8, 2025, the Vestry heard and approved the final audit report for the year ending 2023 from the auditor, Dave Silva of Silva, Sceirine, and Associates. Trinity Episcopal Cathedral received a clean opinion, the highest level of assurance that can be provided. The Vestry also heard an update on the Parish Hall; this update will be presented to the parish on May 25, 2025. Important future dates are the welcome reception celebrating the arrival of Rev. Diana Turner on May 4, 2025 and a celebration to honor the many achievements of Rev. Ruth Hanusa on May 18, 2025. Finally, the Vestry heard from the Co-Treasurers that revenues and expenses remain in line with the 2025 budget.

A Word from your Endowment Committee

Giving a gift to Trinity's Endowment Fund is an ideal way to honor someone or celebrate a special occasion while at the same time furthering our congregation's work on earth.

Sally and Max (not their real names) developed the habit of giving memorial gifts when friends died instead of sending floral arrangements. "In a few days, those flowers will be as dead as our friend," Max would often say. Sally, while scolding him for being so blunt, agreed that a memorial gift to the church was a much more lasting way to remember someone. And so, when Max was called to Glory, Sally asked family and friends to remember him with a donation to the Endowment Fund. She and her family were gratified by the amount of money given in Max's name. "He would be pleased that these memorials in his name are going to do God's work," Sally said. 
Courage Worldwide Summit on Child Trafficking

The Lessons Appointed for Use on Easter Sunday



The Collect

O God, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection delivered us from the power of our enemy: Grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

Old Testament: Acts (10:34-43)

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

The Psalm: 118:1-2, 14-24

1 Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; * his mercy endures for ever.

- 2 Let Israel now proclaim, *
 "His mercy endures for ever."
- 14 The Lord is my strength and my song, * and he has become my salvation.
- 15 There is a sound of exultation and victory * in the tents of the righteous:
- 16 "The right hand of the Lord has triumphed! * the right hand of the Lord is exalted! the right hand of the Lord has triumphed!"
- 17 I shall not die, but live, * and declare the works of the Lord.
- 18 The Lord has punished me sorely, * but he did not hand me over to death.

19 Open for me the gates of righteousness; * I will enter them; I will offer thanks to the Lord.

20 "This is the gate of the Lord; * he who is righteous may enter."

21 I will give thanks to you, for you answered me * and have become my salvation.

22 The same stone which the builders rejected * has become the chief cornerstone.

23 This is the Lord's doing, * and it is marvelous in our eyes.

24 On this day the Lord has acted; * we will rejoice and be glad in it.

The Epistle: 1 Corinthians (15:19-26)

If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

The Gospel: John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, `I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Optional parts of the readings are set off in square brackets.
