A Note from Dean Tim

Alleluia! Christ Is Risen!

Happy Easter! Easter is not a day, but an entire season of 50 days, ending at Pentecost. This first week of Easter is often considered, ironically, a bit of a "dead week." Clergy take a little time to recover from the heavy lift of leading the many observance of the Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday) and Easter. And the Sunday following Easter is the Second Sunday of Easter, but in church circles it's winkingly called "Low Sunday." This is because after everyone came to Easter, very few come on the following Sunday. The attendance is low, the clergy's energy might be low, the choir usually takes the week off... You get the idea.

But our Eastern Orthodox sisters and brothers call this first week of Easter "Bright Week", and it works much like the Triduum- the entire week is one long service. Now, I am really glad to have had a few days off after pushing hard, but there is some appeal to this idea. If nothing else, it does help reinforce that Easter is a continuing season of light.

Speaking of pushing hard, I want to thank everyone that help make Holy Week and Easter Sunday so amazing this year. The choir with its amazing liturgical performances under the leadership of Dr. Bryan Chuan; the Altar Guild's many quick turns and polish under Juliette Leneaux's guidance; the Flower Guild's work under the able leadership of Howard Bennett; Sarah Wheeler's (our Parish Administrator) happy demeanor even while dealing with last minute edits and printing over 1000 bulletins; the delightful greetings of our ushers welcoming all who came; all the members who gave in so many ways this week; and the dedicated celebrants and assisting clergy during the many services including our bishop, Elizabeth... all of YOU made Holy Week and Easter profoundly

beautiful and moving. I'm just sorry I don't have space to thank everyone! Thank you all!

And speaking of profound things, I'd be remiss not to mention the death of the Bishop of Rome on Easter Monday. Francis' choice for his papal name, after St. Francis of Assisi, certainly foreshadowed his consistent push to care for the poor, the oppressed, and our ecosystem. Scripture consistently presses us to care for the same. Though he "hath no jurisdiction" in the Anglican Communion, as Article 37 points out (BCP pp 876-877), we must still recognize the tremendous influence the papacy has amongst our fellow Christians, many of whom grieve Francis' death and wonder who will next fill the seat of St. Peter. Let us pray for them.

I look forward to the many events of the coming Eastertide, including our welcoming of Canon Diana in a few days on May first, celebrating Canon Ruth's ministry among us in a few weeks on May 18th, and our first town hall of the new era of the Faith Like a River campaign, on May 25th. Harvey Fennell and the committee will bring everyone up to date on news about the future Parish Hall, sharing a new design vision for discussion and input, on May 25th. There is much to be thankful for at Trinity as we continue to expand after a major pandemic pause. It feels like resurrection, doesn't it?

The Lord Is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

Notes from the Vestry

At a meeting of the Vestry on April 8, 2025, the Vestry heard and approved the final audit report for the year ending 2023 from the auditor, Dave Silva of Silva, Sceirine, and Associates. Trinity Episcopal Cathedral received a clean opinion, the highest level of assurance that can be provided. The Vestry also heard an update on the Parish Hall; this update will be presented to the parish on May 25, 2025. Important future dates are the welcome reception celebrating the arrival of Rev. Diana Turner on May 4, 2025 and a celebration to honor the many achievements of Rev. Ruth Hanusa on May 18, 2025. Finally, the Vestry heard from the Co-Treasurers that revenues and expenses remain in line with the 2025 budget.

The next Vestry meeting will be held on May 20 at 6:00 p.m. downstairs in the parish hall.

Baby Bundles - Sharing Our Blessings with Others

Baby Bundles is composed of and supported by members of Trinity Episcopal Cathedral and St Catherine's Episcopal Church.

With items donated by both congregations, we assemble bundles of layette items for Renown Hospital. The bundles are then distributed by hospital staff to disadvantaged new parents who have little or nothing for their newborn.

A Word from your Endowment Committee

Giving a gift to Trinity's Endowment Fund is an ideal way to honor someone or celebrate a special occasion while at the same time furthering our congregation's work on earth.

Sally and Max (not their real names) developed the habit of giving memorial gifts when friends died instead of sending floral arrangements. "In a few days, those flowers will be as dead as our friend," Max would often say. Sally, while scolding him for being so blunt, agreed that a memorial gift to the church was a much more lasting way to remember someone. And so, when Max was called to Glory, Sally asked family and friends to remember him with a donation to the Endowment Fund. She and her family were gratified by the amount of money given in Max's name. "He would be pleased that these memorials in his name are going to do God's work," Sally said. Since she always enjoyed singing in the choir, Sally has told her family that when she dies, she wants memorial gifts given to the Trinity Endowment Fund for the choir, so that there will always be funds to pay for music, robes, and instruments.

Memorial gifts do not have to be limited to deaths. They can be given for any occasion—births, marriages, engagements, weddings, confirmations, birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, or any other reason. And these gifts can be made in any amount! There is no minimum or "expected" donation. These memorial gifts help grow the Endowment account. Interest from the account can help fund important projects or needs at Trinity. Money in our Endowment Fund is professionally invested and managed for the best possible returns. Like any charitable gift, memorials to Trinity's Endowment Fund qualify as charitable giving which is deductible at income tax time.

Construction on Arlington Avenue Bridges Project Begins May 5 via RTC Washoe

It's almost time! The Arlington Avenue Bridge Project will get underway on May 5th! The project is anticipated to take at least one year, into summer of 2026. Parishioners coming to cathedral from North Reno and the North Valleys should plan on using Sierra Street until the bridge replacement project is complete. Please plan ahead!

The RTC and the City of Reno are beginning a construction project to replace the Arlington Avenue Bridges spanning the Truckee River at Wingfield Park. These nearly century-old bridges will be transformed into modern, safer crossings that preserve Downtown Reno's character.

Closures & Detours Begin May 5

- Arlington Ave. will close between West 1st St. and Island Ave.
- Northbound traffic will be detoured to the Virginia St. bridge Southbound traffic and pedestrians will be detoured to the Sierra St. bridge
- May 5-11 only: The West 1st St./Arlington Ave. intersection will be closed to all traffic
- Starting May 12: West St. will be open to westbound traffic only between West St. and Stevenson St.
- Wingfield Park will remain closed from May 5 until summer 2026
- River recreation detours will also be in place

Project Improvements

- Enhanced safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, and drivers
- Major roadway improvements and utility upgrades
- Aesthetic enhancements reflecting community input
- North bridge: Reduced from two support piers to one, improving water flow
- South bridge: Clear-span design with no piers
- 32 new trees will be added to the project area, along with 295 new shrubs and plants. While the project design minimizes the number of trees that need to be removed, approximately 15 trees will be removed during construction.

The Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, who in the Paschal mystery established the new covenant of reconciliation: Grant that all who have been reborn into the fellowship of Christ's Body may show forth in their lives what they profess by their faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

Old Testament: Acts (5:27-32)

When the temple police had brought the apostles, they had them stand before the council. The high priest questioned them, saying, "We gave you strict orders not to teach in this name, yet here you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and you are determined to bring this man's blood on us." But Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than any human authority. The God of our ancestors raised up Jesus, whom you had killed by hanging him on a tree. God exalted him at his right hand as Leader and Savior that he might give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins. And we are witnesses to these things, and so is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

The Psalm: 150

1 Hallelujah!

Praise God in his holy temple; *
praise him in the firmament of his power.

2 Praise him for his mighty acts; *
praise him for his excellent greatness.

3 Praise him with the blast of the ram's-horn; *

The Epistle: Revelation (1:4-8)

John to the seven churches that are in Asia: Grace to you and peace from him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before his throne, and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.

To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

Look! He is coming with the clouds; every eye will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen. "I am the Alpha and the Omega," says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty.

The Gospel: John 20:19-31

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.
