A Note from Dean Tim

"Surely your goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, * and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever." (Psalm 23:6)

This verse is my favorite part about Psalm 23. The Hebrew word "radaf" in the verse might be more accurately translated as "pursue me" instead of "follow me." There's more of a concept of spirited chase (as in hunting) than is usually seen in English translations. And I love the idea of God chasing after us.

It reminds me of one of my early childhood memories, in the Sawtooth Mountains of Idaho. I was perhaps four years old. I don't remember much about it, except that we were looking for pinecones that my grandmother intended to use for decorations. In any event, I wandered off near Johnson Creek, swollen with the spring run-off. I vaguely remember my mother coming over a rise, running toward me. Pursuing me. The story goes that I had disappeared, and my family was afraid I had fallen into the creek. I just remember my mother running and sweeping me into her arms, crying but relieved.

It was not my intention to wander off that day. I had just sort of meandered away in search of the perfect pinecone. Sheep do this as well. They wander about grazing without being overly concerned with where they are. They can literally nibble their way lost. People do this too. A shepherd must maintain awareness and redirect them back to the flock, pursuing them when they stray, chasing them down to save them from wandering into danger. For a four-year-old this could be a rushing creek. For a sheep it can be any number of things from wolves to rushing water as well. For human beings the wolves are more often metaphorical, but they are out there.

Thank God for the good shepherds in our lives that chase after us out of their love and care for us; be they Jesus, our moms, or anyone else. The happy juxtaposition of Good Shepherd's Sunday and Mother's Day is a good opportunity for us to express our appreciation for all those who, in our transitory existence, have redirected us toward safer pastures. To all the mothers, and others who have also mothered us in some way, thank you! Keep up the pursuit. It is so worth it and so appreciated. Happy Mother's Day!

A few housekeeping notes... I want to issue a quick reminder that the Arlington Bridge Project is now underway. It appears that First Street will be blocked in addition to Arlington. If you are coming from the Northwest, please approach the Cathedral from Sierra, using Second Street. If you are coming from the Southwest, I recommend California to Arlington to Court Street. Arlington is open coming from the south and I am told it will remain so. The construction barriers begin at Island Avenue.

Finally, I am joining with cathedral deans from the US and Canada this week. We are meeting together at our sister Trinity Cathedral in Omaha. We will be hearing from our new Presiding Bishop, The Most Reverend Sean Rowe, to learn more about his vision for the next nine years, and how cathedrals fit into it. I look forward to absorbing information from him and my fellow deans. Please pray for us in our collegiality and work. I hope to share what I learn with you in the coming weeks!

Construction on Arlington Avenue Bridges Project Begins May 5 via RTC Washoe

It's almost time! The Arlington Avenue Bridge Project will get underway on May 5th! The project is anticipated to take at least one year, into summer of 2026. Parishioners coming to cathedral from North Reno and the North Valleys should plan on using Sierra Street until the bridge replacement project is complete. Please plan ahead!

The RTC and the City of Reno are beginning a construction project to replace the Arlington Avenue Bridges spanning the Truckee River at Wingfield Park. These nearly century-old bridges will be transformed into modern, safer crossings that preserve Downtown Reno's character.

Closures & Detours Begin May 5

- Arlington Ave. will close between West 1st St. and Island Ave.
- Northbound traffic will be detoured to the Virginia St. bridge Southbound traffic and pedestrians will be detoured to the Sierra St. bridge
- May 5-11 only: The West 1st St./Arlington Ave. intersection will be closed to all traffic
- Starting May 12: West St. will be open to westbound traffic only between West St. and Stevenson St.
- Wingfield Park will remain closed from May 5 until summer 2026
- River recreation detours will also be in place

Project Improvements

- Enhanced safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, and drivers
- Major roadway improvements and utility upgrades
- Aesthetic enhancements reflecting community input
- North bridge: Reduced from two support piers to one, improving water flow
- South bridge: Clear-span design with no piers
- 32 new trees will be added to the project area, along with 295 new shrubs and plants. While the project design minimizes the number of trees that need to be removed, approximately 15 trees will be removed during construction.

The Collect

O God, whose Son Jesus is the good shepherd of your people: Grant that when we hear his voice we may know him who calls us each by name, and follow where he leads; who, with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

Old Testament: Acts 9:36-43

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

The Psalm: 23

1 The Lord is my shepherd; * I shall not be in want.

- 2 He makes me lie down in green pastures * and leads me beside still waters.
- 3 He revives my soul * and quides me along right pathways for his Name's sake.
- 4 Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I shall fear no evil; * for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.
- 5 You spread a table before me in the presence of those who trouble me; * you have anointed my head with oil, and my cup is running over.
- 6 Surely your goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, \ast and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The Epistle: Revelation 7:9-17

I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their

hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

For this reason they are before the throne of God,

and worship him day and night within his temple,

and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.

They will hunger no more, and thirst no more;

the sun will not strike them,

nor any scorching heat;

for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd,

and he will guide them to springs of the water of life,

and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

The Gospel: John 10:22-30

At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, "How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly." Jesus answered, "I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one."
