## In Celebration of Father Julius' 50th Anniversary of Ordination as a Priest

On the 29<sup>th</sup> day of June, 2025, the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, I will celebrate 50 years of being ordained a priest in the Church. I was received as a priest into this part of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church, the Episcopal Church in the United States of America, on June 2nd, 1988, by Stewart C. Zabriskie, Bishop, Diocese of Nevada. I was ordained a priest on June 29<sup>th</sup>, 1975, by Cardinal Franjo Kuharic, Archbishop of Zagreb Archdiocese, Croatia.

I am grateful for the baptismal ministry opportunities bestowed upon me on the day of my priestly ordination. It has been 50 years of service to the People of God, marked by teaching, preaching, reconciling, praying, and administering the Sacraments of the Church. Most of all, I am grateful for presiding at the Eucharistic Table. I am constantly reminded that we being many are, but one bread, one body in Christ Jesus. We all drink from one Eucharistic cup. We take the Eucharistic bread, break it, receive it, and offer it for our salvation and the salvation of one another, and this beautiful earth, our island home. Eating the broken Eucharistic Bread and drinking from the one Eucharistic cup transforms us into behaviors that flourish with justice and mercy as followers of Jesus, loving Him more dearly day by day.

Thank you all for being such a rich part of my journey as a priest. I especially thank my dear family members. They have been my best teachers, supporting me with affection, engaging in nourishing conversations, and posing challenging questions. I am grateful to Bishop Elizabeth Bonforte Gardner and Dean Timothy Watt for corroborating and confirming my journey as a priest in the Episcopal Church, Diocese of Nevada, and at Trinity Cathedral. I am grateful to our Dean Emeritus, V. James Jeffery, for mentoring me as I transitioned into the Episcopal Church as a priest.

My prayer for us all is, Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in us the fire of your love!

Acts of Kindness & Service - how you've served others in His name and how that's shaping your heart



#### **Vestry News**

At a meeting of the Vestry on June 17, 2025, the Vestry was advised that new technology to assist those with hearing difficulties is on order and should be available sometime this summer.

The Vestry also discussed the Mutual Ministry Review conducted June 12, 2025 and facilitated by the Rev. Rick

O'Brien. Take-aways included how much Trinity has going for it, the need for a greater social media presence, and the need to ensure that the Lord is always part of the Vestry's work.

The Vestry approved a housing allowance for Canon Diana Turner.

At the recommendation of the Facilities Committee, the vestry approved the funds to refinish the outside cathedral doors. The Junior Warden, Bruce Bethke, also reported that installation of the water fountains should begin on June 24, 2025.

The Town Hall meeting to present and seek feedback on the initial drafts for a new parish hall was discussed. Comments can be sent to the Dean through July 18, 2025.

In a continuing tradition, the very fun summer picnic was also discussed with thanks to the 9 o'clock service for coordinating it. The next parish picnic will be held on August 24, 2025 after the 10 o'clock service.

Senior Warden Margaret Brown noted that Sandi Brooke has been cleaning up after the 10 o'clock service each week by herself and needs assistance. Those willing to pitch in and help should contact Sandi.

The Vestry reviewed and discussed 7 proposed commissions, including Liturgy, Outreach, Inreach, Finance and Facilities, Intergenerational, Welcome and Hospitality, and Development. These Commissions are designed to better align and support Trinity's ministries. Vestry members will give consideration as to which commission they might want to participate on.

Ann Morgan reported that the Welcome and Hospitality Commission met June 15, 2025. A small group of parishioners from each service along with the Vestry, using the book *Invite, Welcome, Connect*, will meet once a month for the next three months to work on how we might more intentionally invite, welcome, and connect with those who might want to attend Trinity, those just joining us, and those who have been members for a long time.

Finally, the Vestry heard from the Co-Treasurers. Revenues are below budget approximately \$5,000 as of May. As we enter what are the traditionally leaner months of summer, the Vestry encourages all pledging members to pay their pledge monthly as expenses continue to be incurred monthly.

The next Vestry meeting will be held on July 15, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. downstairs in the Parish Hall.

#### **Parish Hall Construction**

At a Town Hall Meeting following the 10 o'clock service on Sunday, June 15, 2025, the Chair of the Building Committee and Dean Tim Watt presented some initial drafts of a proposed new Parish Hall. Harvey Fennell noted that while the existing parish hall is sound, it cannot be reconfigured to be updated as the downstairs walls are load-bearing support for the upstairs floor.

Dean Tim also noted that a Capital Campaign will be required to raise additional funds both to complete the new Parish Hall and to repair and protect the existing stained glass windows in the cathedral. An endowed maintenance fund will also be established. Trinity is grateful to the many members who contributed to the fund such that this construction can move forward once the design is finalized. A particular thanks is given to Lash and Gigi Turville, whose significant gift allows this to become a reality, and for whom the Parish Hall is named.

## **UNR's Shared History Program Seeks Participants**

Our research documents historical and modern forms of community building and perseverance while highlighting stories from historically underrepresented groups. We are especially interested in looking into these groups' perspectives on housing, the meaning of home, and community.

We're collecting oral histories in Northern Nevada. The oral historical process aims to collect first-hand accounts of past events and personal or community perspectives on lived experiences. In this process we aim to include diverse, intergenerational voices to create a rich tapestry of Nevada's history. Our interview process typically takes 1 to 2 hours. Interviews are either in Lincoln Hall at the University of Nevada, on site, or at a location convenient for our interviewees.

## The Lessons Appointed for Use on the Third Sunday after Pentecost



#### The Collect

Almighty God, you have built your Church upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone: Grant us so to be joined together in unity of spirit by their teaching, that we may be made a holy temple acceptable to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.* 

**The First Lesson:** 2 Kings (2:1-2, 6-14)

When the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel.

Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

He picked up the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him, and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan. He took the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him, and struck the water, saying, "Where is the Lord, the God of Elijah?" When he had struck the water, the water was parted to the one side and to the other, and Elisha went over.

The Response: Psalm 77:1-2, 11-20
1 I will cry aloud to God; \*
I will cry aloud, and he will hear me.
2 In the day of my trouble I sought the Lord; \*
my hands were stretched out by night and did not tire;
I refused to be comforted.
11 I will remember the works of the Lord, \*
and call to mind your wonders of old time.
12 I will meditate on all your acts \*
and ponder your mighty deeds.
13 Your way, O God, is holy; \*
who is so great a god as our God?
14 You are the God who works wonders \*
and have declared your power among the peoples.
15 By your strength you have redeemed your people, \*

the children of Jacob and Joseph.

16 The waters saw you, O God;
the waters saw you and trembled; \*
the very depths were shaken.

17 The clouds poured out water;
the skies thundered; \*
your arrows flashed to and fro;
18 The sound of your thunder was in the whirlwind;
your lightnings lit up the world; \*
the earth trembled and shook.

19 Your way was in the sea,
and your paths in the great waters, \*
yet your footsteps were not seen.

20 You led your people like a flock \*
by the hand of Moses and Aaron.

The Epistle: Galatians (5:1,13-25)

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

## The Gospel: Luke 9:51-62

When the days drew near for Jesus to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; but they did not receive him, because his face was set toward Jerusalem. When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" But he turned and rebuked them. Then they went on to another village.

As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."
