The Dean's Dispatch

(Jesus) said to them, "When you pray, say:
Father, hallowed be your name.
Your kingdom come.
Give us each day our daily bread.
And forgive us our sins,
for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us.
And do not bring us to the time of trial." (Luke 11:2-4)

A few of you have asked me what Fr. Julius meant when he was saying "pericope" in his sermon on Sunday (sounds like prick-a-pe in conversation). It's a fancy Greek word that means a "clipping" or a "snippet" that has been cut out of larger scripture. The lectionary naturally has to be limited to a small amount for our worship. After all, Episcopalians start to get antsy if the sermon goes much longer that 12 minutes or so... I can't imagine how well it would go if I decided to read the entirety of Luke's gospel account to you every week! Instead, we get little bits of scripture for the people to consider and the preacher to expound each day of the week, not just Sundays. Did you know that if you pray the daily office and go to church each Sunday for three years that you would hear (read) the vast majority of the Bible in that time? It's true! Don't let anyone tell you that Anglicans aren't a bible-church. We typically read more of it than anyone!

This Sunday I will probably focus more on the reading (pericope) from Hosea (You'll see why when we read it) than the Gospel selection. That said, I love Luke's account of Jesus teaching the disciples the Our Father. It's the short version. The one in Matthew (Matt. 6:9-13) is a touch longer than Luke's version, but both are combined for the Our Father that we pray at every service in the Episcopal Church. Our version is based off of Archbishop of Canterbury's, Thomas Cranmer's, translation. It goes back to 1549 and has influenced every English version of

the prayer since. It is as familiar to us as putting on a favorite sweater, so we might not take time to think about how momentous a prayer it is. So, I thought I'd try my hand at a direct translation of Luke's version in more contemporary English:

Father, your name is Sacred Your kingdom is becoming Give us even tomorrow's bread even today Forgive our sins For we too free everyone indebted to us And do not allow us to be tested.

It may feel weird to not follow the pattern we're used to, but I commend this to your prayers for the coming week. Use it as a means to think through, more deeply, what Jesus taught us is important in prayer...

- Do we acknowledge God's Sacred nature daily?
- Are we helping the Kingdom to become, now?
- Do we trust that God's providence will provide, or do we think we need to fight and scratch for what we need every day? (Hint: there's enough for us all. Truly).
- Do we really believe that God will forgive our failings? (God already has)
- Do we forgive others what we believe they owe us for what they have done to anger us? (we only spire ourselves with such thinking).
- Do we allow God to redirect us in our many temptations to sin, or do we ignore God's still, small voice calling us to something greater?

If you take time to really think about it, the Lord's prayer is perfectly well-rounded. Sure, we can wax on more eloquently... but do we need to?

Now on Sunday let's chat about that troubling language from Hosea...

Pray away!

A Word from your Endowment Committee

Time for a Check-up

It's hard to believe that we are already halfway through 2025! With this calendar year half done, this is a good time for a quick review of your long-range plans. Here are some things to consider:

First, do you have a will prepared that reflects your wishes? Times and situations change; having a current will, prepared by an attorney who specializes in this work is essential in making sure your wishes are carried out, regardless of your age!

For many of us, a living trust is another useful document that, among other things, avoids the long and expensive probate process while providing for those we leave behind.

Do you have a durable power of attorney for health care and one for finances? These two important documents name a person of your choosing to act for you in case of incapacity. Having a DNR in place directs your end-of-life requests. It's also a good idea to speak with Dean Tim about your funeral/burial instructions and then put them in writing so that family members will not be burdened with making important decisions at a difficult time.

One more thing- be sure to check the beneficiary designations on your insurance policies, retirement, and other accounts. These govern who receives the proceeds from these accounts; make sure they reflect your current wishes.

You can name our Trinity Endowment Fund as a beneficiary in many of these documents. As followers of Christ, we know our stewardship of our Lord's resources does not end with our earthly life. Prayerful consideration of a gift to Trinity helps to secure our congregation's earthly future. Ask your estate planning professional or contact a member of our endowment committee if you have questions.

UNR's Shared History Program Seeks Participants

Our research documents historical and modern forms of community building and perseverance while highlighting stories from historically underrepresented groups. We are especially interested in looking into these groups' perspectives on housing, the meaning of home, and community.

We're collecting oral histories in Northern Nevada. The oral historical process aims to collect first-hand accounts of past events and personal or community perspectives on lived experiences. In this process we aim to include diverse, intergenerational voices to create a rich tapestry of Nevada's history. Our interview process typically takes 1 to 2 hours. Interviews are either in Lincoln Hall at the University of Nevada, on site, or at a location convenient for our interviewees.

The Lessons Appointed for Use on the Seventh Sunday after Pentecost



The Collect

O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy: Increase and multiply upon us your mercy; that, with you as our ruler and guide, we may so pass through things temporal, that we lose not the things eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

The First Lesson: Hosea 1:2-10

When the Lord first spoke through Hosea, the Lord said to Hosea, "Go, take for yourself a wife of whoredom and have children of whoredom, for the land commits great whoredom by forsaking the Lord." So he went and took Gomer daughter of Diblaim, and she conceived and bore him a son.

And the Lord said to him, "Name him Jezreel; for in a little while I will punish the house of Jehu for the blood of Jezreel, and I will put an end to the kingdom of the house of Israel. On that day I will break the bow of Israel in the valley of Jezreel."

She conceived again and bore a daughter. Then the Lord said to him, "Name her Lo-ruhamah, for I will no longer have pity on the house of Israel or forgive them. But I will have pity on the house of Judah, and I will save them by the Lord their God; I will not save them by bow, or by sword, or by war, or by horses, or by horsemen."

When she had weaned Lo-ruhamah, she conceived and bore a son. Then the Lord said, "Name him Lo-ammi, for you are not my people and I am not your God."

Yet the number of the people of Israel shall be like the sand of the sea, which can be neither measured nor numbered; and in the place where it was said to them, "You are not my people," it shall be said to them, "Children of the living God."

The Response: Psalm 85

1 You have been gracious to your land, O Lord, * you have restored the good fortune of Jacob.

- 2 You have forgiven the iniquity of your people * and blotted out all their sins.
- 3 You have withdrawn all your fury * and turned yourself from your wrathful indignation.
- 4 Restore us then, O God our Savior; * let your anger depart from us.
- 5 Will you be displeased with us for ever? * will you prolong your anger from age to age?
- 6 Will you not give us life again, * that your people may rejoice in you?
- 7 Show us your mercy, O Lord, *

and grant us your salvation.

8 I will listen to what the Lord God is saying, * for he is speaking peace to his faithful people and to those who turn their hearts to him.

- 9 Truly, his salvation is very near to those who fear him, * that his glory may dwell in our land.
- 10 Mercy and truth have met together; * righteousness and peace have kissed each other.
- 11 Truth shall spring up from the earth, * and righteousness shall look down from heaven.
- 12 The Lord will indeed grant prosperity, * and our land will yield its increase.
- 13 Righteousness shall go before him, * and peace shall be a pathway for his feet.

The Epistle: Colossians 2:6-15, (16-19)

As you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.

[Therefore do not let anyone condemn you in matters of food and drink or of observing festivals, new moons, or sabbaths. These are only a shadow of what is to come, but the substance belongs to Christ. Do not let anyone disqualify you, insisting on self-abasement and worship of angels, dwelling on visions, puffed up without cause by a human way of thinking, and not holding fast to the head, from whom the whole body, nourished and held together by its ligaments and sinews, grows with a growth that is from God.]

The Gospel: Luke 11:1-13

Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." He said to them, "When you pray, say:

Father, hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come.

Give us each day our daily bread.

And forgive us our sins,

for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us.

And do not bring us to the time of trial."

And he said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, `Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him.' And he answers from within, `Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything.' I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs.

"So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"
