The Dean's Dispatch

Let your continual mercy, O Lord, cleanse and defend your Church; and, because it cannot continue in safety without your help, protect and govern it always by your goodness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect for Proper 13, BCP. p. 232)

A funny thing about Christianity in America these days is that there are any number of people who seem to believe that it is their job to defend the Church. These folks have strong opinions about things and possess a certainty about their positions. The funny thing is that I don't always agree with them, having a different understanding born of a life of prayer and reading the bible... which I figure I've read cover to cover about 15 or 16 times now. I still don't think I have it all quite nailed down yet. I am often surprised to have my understanding of passages change as my experiences in life increase. For me, the study of scripture is a living relationship. I can't imagine a life where the Word is cold and unchangeable.

I love this Sunday's collect for this timely reminder that the Church continues in safety under the defense of God alone. We don't need to spend our precious time being anxious about protecting the Church. We need only appreciate the joy of being in assembly with one another. The word we translate as Church in the New Testament is ekklesia. It originally just meant the assembly... When the people of the Jesus' Way assemble in worship and fellowship, really transformative and lively things happen. Focus on the joy of that instead of harboring any anxiety against others who do not believe exactly as you do. Be orthodox, yes... but also patient and flexible. The early Church didn't grow because of dogmatic requirement. It grew because people saw how much Christians loved one another, and others.

When we love others and provide a place of belonging for them amongst us, a lot of healing happens. There is such a need for it in a world where the disaffected turn to violence. This week's news about the mass shooting at

the GSR is a tragedy for the lives lost and for the fact that someone was so put out of society that they would visit such random violence on others.

Let's do better and invite others into a place governed by the goodness of God and in communion with one another.

A great opportunity to invite others will be on **August 10th**. I invite all students to bring their favorite backpack or other school bag to the 10am Eucharist for the annual **Blessing of the Backpacks**. This is an opportunity to carry the love of the cathedral assembly throughout the coming year. We've got your back!

Ministry News

Vestry News

At a zoom meeting of the Vestry on July 15, 2025 the Vestry reviewed the seven ministry commissions and appointed liaisons to each. The commissions are: Liturgy, Outreach, Inreach, Finance and Facilities, Intergenerational, Welcome and Hospitality, and Development. Each vestry liaison will contact the leads of the ministries that fall under each commission, obtain a brief description of the ministry, and report on those ministries at each monthly vestry meeting. This project advances the three annual goals set by the vestry for 2025: a) Improve our capabilities to invite and warmly welcome others to share their gifts; b) Review and understand the various ministries at Trinity so we can promote them for ourselves and others who are looking for ways to actively engage their gifts; and c) Work toward the construction of a new space that will better serve our ministries and re-engage our Faith Like a River Capital Improvement Campaign. A Ministry Fair will follow each service on September 13 and 14, 2025.

The vestry heard a report on the new nightly security patrols. The vestry heard a report from the Welcome and Hospitality Commission and the Facilities Committee. The water fountains are installed but require additional work before they can be used as intended.

Finally, the vestry heard a report from the Co-Treasurer who advised that so far, Income exceeds Budget and expenses are under Budget for a net of \$6,949.95. Some pledges remain outstanding and parishioners are urged to bring those pledges up to date.

The next vestry meeting will be held August 19 at 6:00 p.m. in the Parish Hall Conference Room.

The Collect

Let your continual mercy, O Lord, cleanse and defend your Church; and, because it cannot continue in safety without your help, protect and govern it always by your goodness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

The First Lesson: Hosea 11:1-11 When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son.

The more I called them, the more they went from me;

they kept sacrificing to the Baals, and offering incense to idols.

Yet it was I who taught Ephraim to walk, I took them up in my arms; but they did not know that I healed them.

I led them with cords of human kindness, with bands of love.

I was to them like those who lift infants to their cheeks. I bent down to them and fed them.

They shall return to the land of Egypt, and Assyria shall be their king, because they have refused to return to me.

The sword rages in their cities, it consumes their oracle-priests, and devours because of their schemes.

My people are bent on turning away from me. To the Most High they call, but he does not raise them up at all.

How can I give you up, Ephraim? How can I hand you over, O Israel?

How can I make you like Admah? How can I treat you like Zeboiim?

My heart recoils within me; my compassion grows warm and tender.

I will not execute my fierce anger; I will not again destroy Ephraim;

for I am God and no mortal, the Holy One in your midst, and I will not come in wrath.

They shall go after the Lord, who roars like a lion;

when he roars, his children shall come trembling from the west.

They shall come trembling like birds from Egypt, and like doves from the land of Assyria; and I will return them to their homes, says the Lord.

The Response: Psalm 107:1-9, 43 1 Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, * and his mercy endures for ever.

- 2 Let all those whom the Lord has redeemed proclaim * that he redeemed them from the hand of the foe.
- 3 He gathered them out of the lands; * from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.
- 4 Some wandered in desert wastes; * they found no way to a city where they might dwell.
- 5 They were hungry and thirsty; * their spirits languished within them.
- 6 Then they cried to the Lord in their trouble, * and he delivered them from their distress.
- 7 He put their feet on a straight path * to go to a city where they might dwell.
- 8 Let them give thanks to the Lord for his mercy * and the wonders he does for his children.
- 9 For he satisfies the thirsty * and fills the hungry with good things.
- 43 Whoever is wise will ponder these things, * and consider well the mercies of the Lord.

The Epistle: Colossians 3:1-11

If you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. But now you must get rid of all such things-- anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

The Gospel: Luke 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, `What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, `I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, `Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, `You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."
