## The Dean's Dispatch

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. (Hebrews 13:2)

I absolutely love this quote from our epistle selection for this coming Sunday. My mom was, at one point in time, an avid cross-stitcher. She did a cross-stitch with this quote from the Letter to the Hebrews that still hangs by the door of her home. I remember reading it every day on my way out the door as a kid. It hangs there as a reminder to greet everyone who comes to the door with respect and hospitable grace. It's a good reminder to us all, in an era where our default is suspicion, that God expects us to be hospitable.

The author of the letter is unknown. Paul did not write it, though habit often has lectors say so. They are known only to God, but their words really ought to be well known to us. Hebrews focuses on the eternal high priesthood of Jesus Christ, in which we all participate as baptized members of the priesthood of all believers. It's an important letter, written to the Jewish Christ-followers in Rome. Those first recipients would have easily thought of such angelic/divine visits in the Book of Genesis. The first would be visitors Abraham received at the Oaks of Mamre. The second would be Jacob's all-night WWF wrestling match at Peniel on the fork of the Jabbok River. Both were instrumental pivot points in God's relationship with Abraham and his descendants, Israel's (Jacob's) children.

They are important words for the Church today. We must greet everyone who comes to our cathedral with reverence and grace, welcoming them with great hospitality. To that end, the vestry and the new welcoming committee have spent the summer reading through "Invite, Welcome, Connect" by Mary Foster Parmer. It provides a foundation for making us all aware of the angels in our midst whom we must welcome with Christ's love. Ann Morgan has been leading a great study. We will soon be seeking your help, not just in welcoming others

to our fantastic community, but in learning how to invite them here to join in the great things we are doing.

Part of the process is making sure people know how to get around the Cathedral, so you may have noticed tasteful, temporary, directional signage to point out rooms and amenities. This is a simple first step in our work of welcome this year, one of the three goals the vestry has set for the parish. Please let us know if you have any recommended edits for those signs. We hope to get them perfect and then replace them with permanent signage when we build the new parish hall.

A quick reminder that this is the very last weekend of the summer worship schedule. Our normal program year schedule begins September 6<sup>th</sup>!

### **Vestry News**

At a meeting of the Vestry on August 19, 2025, Vestry commission liaisons reported on information collected on Trinity's various ministries. It is the Vestry's goal to include on the website a short statement about each ministry at Trinity, along with how members may get involved.

Trinity will host this year's Diocesan Convention, October 9 - 11, 2025. A committee of those interested in helping set up and take down Thursday evening and Saturday morning is being established. Those interested in assisting should notify the office.

The Vestry approved expenses incurred in searching for a new Music Director and authorized relocation expenses.

The Vestry heard a presentation on a monthly pot luck at Trinity to encourage community and fellowship from Mikkel Basset. The first will be held on Wednesday, October 1, 2025, in the Parish Hall, hosted by Canon Diana and her husband, Ted.

The revised plans for the Turville Parish Hall, which take into consideration the feedback received from the parish, are being reviewed. Final design is anticipated to be submitted to the Vestry for approval in September.

Finally, the Vestry heard a report from the co-treasurers, who advised that income continues to trail budget, but expenses are also below budget, yielding a net of approximately \$11,000 above budget. Quarterly pledge statements have gone out to all members, and parishioners are encouraged to bring their pledges current.

The next Vestry meeting will be held September 16, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. in the Parish Hall Conference Room.

### A Word from your Endowment Committee

Making a will, trust, or estate plan is not something to do only when you're "older." These important plans can and should be made anytime and updated often, as your needs and situations change.

Consider Todd and Cindy (not their real names). This young couple is busy raising their two youngsters, establishing their careers, and paying off some college loans. They talked about writing a will "later on." That changed when they learned that one of Todd's college roommates, Dean, was tragically killed in a highway accident, leaving a wife and child behind. Because Todd's friend did not have a will, his estate was tied up in the expensive process of probate. In addition to dealing with the great sorrow she felt, his wife had to handle the probate process with attorneys, accountants, and the courts. And there were some conflicts within the family about "what Dean would have wanted."

So Todd and Cindy met with an attorney who specializes in estate plans. He worked with them to write a will and living trust that clearly reflects their wishes, identifies a trustee for their young children, and designates a portion of their estate to their church. The plan can be easily changed as their family does. And Todd and Cindy's plan will help them avoid the costly and time consuming probate process.

A will, trust, and overall estate plan is appropriate and important at any age and demonstrates good stewardship of what God has entrusted to us on earth. 

# The Lessons Appointed for Use on the Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost



### **The Collect**

Lord of all power and might, the author and giver of all good things: Graft in our hearts the love of your Name; increase in us true religion; nourish us with all goodness; and bring forth in us the fruit of good works; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. *Amen.* 

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 2:4-13

Hear the word of the Lord, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel. Thus says the Lord:

What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me, and went after worthless things, and became worthless themselves? They did not say, "Where is the Lord

who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?" I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruits and its good things. But when you entered you defiled my land, and made my heritage an abomination. The priests did not say, "Where is the Lord?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rulers transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal, and went after things that do not profit. Therefore once more I accuse you, says the Lord, and I accuse your children's children. Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look, send to Kedar and examine with care; see if there has ever been such a thing. Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are no gods? But my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit. Be appalled, O heavens, at this, be shocked, be utterly desolate, says the Lord,

for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves, cracked cisterns that can hold no water.

The Response: Psalm 81:1, 10-16 1 Sing with joy to God our strength \* and raise a loud shout to the God of Jacob. 10 I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt and said, \* "Open your mouth wide, and I will fill it." 11 And yet my people did not hear my voice, \* and Israel would not obey me. 12 So I gave them over to the stubbornness of their hearts, \* to follow their own devices. 13 Oh, that my people would listen to me! \* that Israel would walk in my ways! 14 I should soon subdue their enemies \* and turn my hand against their foes. 15 Those who hate the Lord would cringe before him, \* and their punishment would last for ever. 16 But Israel would I feed with the finest wheat \* and satisfy him with honey from the rock.

### **The Epistle:** Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled; for God will judge fornicators and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we can say with confidence,

"The Lord is my helper;

I will not be afraid.

What can anyone do to me?"

Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

### **The Gospel:** Luke 14:1, 7-14

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."
