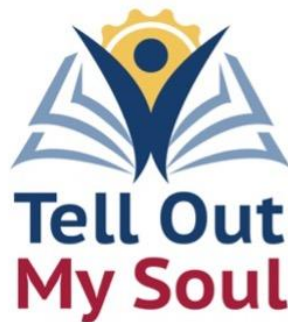

Dear Trinitarians,

As Christians we are story tellers. We have an ancient narrative, one that describes the beginning of time and the

relationship between God and God's Creation. We see this story grow through the prophetic tradition until our story recounts the life and gifts of the Son of God. But the story doesn't end with the Resurrection just as it did not end with the Cross, it continues on in each of us today as we encounter and are transformed by the Good News.

Luke's Gospel is bookended by the animated story-telling of two women named Mary. Early in the Gospel, Mary the mother of Jesus, tells us of her encounter with the Divine who informs her that she will bear a child who will change the world. She proclaims her joy: "Tell out my soul! The Greatness of the Lord!" (from Hymn 437, Hymnal 1982. It paraphrases the Magnificat, Mary's prophetic hymn of joy) At the end of the Gospel, another Mary, Mary Magdalene, visits the tomb to discover it empty and receives instructions from the Risen Christ to go tell the others. She carries this Good News with jubilation to the Disciples, becoming the Apostle to the Apostles.

What is your Good News; the idea, dream, or challenge placed in your heart by God, that needs to be shared? What is the ministry to which you are called which will change the world, sharing your talents, gifts, and love with your neighbors?

Our Stewardship Campaign this year will focus on these stories – the ones inside you, the ones you are still writing, and the ones we tell about those saints who have gone before us. Together we will "Tell Out Our Joy," in stewardship this year. We are beneficiaries of those saints who go before us. Others before us built our cathedral and tended it to leave in our care. Each generation has made offerings of time, talent, and treasure since Trinity's founding in 1870. And we do so in our own time. A significant part of our stewardship can continue even after death, if we leave legacy gifts to our endowment. Just this week, that endowment is paying for a much-needed refinishing of our cathedral doors.

This Saturday, at 9 am, we will have a seminar about planning for the disposition of your estate after death. It's a hard thing to consider but an important one, regardless. At the seminar, which should last about two hours, we will learn about structuring trusts and wills from preeminent lawyers in our area who focus on estate planning. And yes, I do ask that you remember your parish in your estate plans. We continue to thrive because others have done so. It is important we do so as well. We will also go over the importance of funeral planning as well, as a part of your legacy. **Please RSVP today by emailing the cathedral office.**

We are all a part of the continuing story of God– the ongoing Creation of God's Kingdom. As you pray about how you will share your gifts with us this year and in the future, think about how God is calling you to tell out your soul, to spread the Good News far and wide. Hear the stories that we share weekly throughout the campaign that relate the creative spark in us with the ways in which we are called to serve God and love our neighbor.

The Canon's Corner

*Lord, help us to love as You love.
Give us hearts that are kind, open, and full of grace.
Teach us to see others through Your eyes. Amen.*

In today's world, it's easy to feel divided. Political tensions, cultural differences, and personal struggles often pull us apart. As followers of Christ, we are called to love deeply, actively, and intentionally.

What is love? It's listening when it's easier to argue, reaching out when it's easier to stay silent, forgiving when the world says to hold a grudge and showing up for those the world overlooks. Jesus loved those society rejected, and he calls us to do the same. Love isn't passive. It's bold, generous, and real.

It starts here. Our congregation is a sacred space. Let's greet one another with warmth, support each other in prayer, and let that love ripple outward into our homes, workplaces, and communities.

It's commitment. In a noisy world, love asks us to pause, reflect, and choose grace over anger, empathy over indifference.

This week, Paul reminds us in **1 Timothy 6:6–19** that true wealth is found in godliness with contentment. We're called but to pursue righteousness, faith, love, endurance, and gentleness. To be generous and ready to share, storing up treasure in heaven and taking hold of the life that is truly life.

Jesus also tells the story of the rich man and Lazarus in **Luke 16:19–31**. The rich man lived in luxury while Lazarus suffered at his gate. When both died, Lazarus was comforted, and the rich man tormented. The rich man begged for relief and for Lazarus to warn his family but was told they already had the truth. They must choose to live it.

Our Gospel reminds us: love isn't just about words but how we treat others. The rich man didn't harm Lazarus, he ignored him. That silence had eternal weight.

As we gather for our first **Common Table** Wednesday night, let's remember Lazarus, open our eyes to those around us who are hurting, lonely, or overlooked and let our love be active, generous, and real as we invite others to The Common Table.

Let's be known by our love in every handshake, every shared meal, and every quiet prayer may we reflect the love of Christ.

May we be people of open hearts and open hands.
May our love be loud in a quiet world.
May we see with Christ's eyes, serve with His hands, and welcome with His grace.
And may The Common Table be a place where heaven touches earth. Amen.

Contemplative Outreach of Northern Nevada is presenting a free Introductory Centering Prayer Workshop. This event will be hosted by Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Reno, Nevada on **Saturday, October 4 from 9am – 1pm** in the sanctuary.

The centering prayer workshop will teach a method of silent prayer that is rooted in the Christian contemplative heritage. It is a gentle silent method of consenting to God's presence and action within us. By taking time to "rest in God" each day, we open ourselves to the gift of God's presence. Come and learn more about this transformational prayer practice.

The program includes talks by Contemplative Outreach presenters and instructional videos by Fr. Thomas Keating, O.C.S.O. 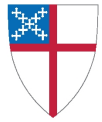

The Lessons Appointed for Use on the Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost



The Collect

O God, you declare your almighty power chiefly in showing mercy and pity: Grant us the fullness of your grace, that we, running to obtain your promises, may become partakers of your heavenly treasure; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15

The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord in the tenth year of King Zedekiah of Judah, which was the eighteenth year of Nebuchadnezzar. At that time the army of the king of Babylon was besieging Jerusalem, and the prophet Jeremiah was confined in the court of the guard that was in the palace of the king of Judah, where King Zedekiah of Judah had confined him.

Jeremiah said, The word of the Lord came to me: Hanamel son of your uncle Shallum is going to come to you and say, "Buy my field that is at Anathoth, for the right of redemption by purchase is yours." Then my cousin Hanamel came to me in the court of the guard, in accordance with the word of the Lord, and said to me, "Buy my field that is at Anathoth in the land of Benjamin, for the right of possession and redemption is yours; buy it for yourself." Then I knew that this was the word of the Lord.

And I bought the field at Anathoth from my cousin Hanamel, and weighed out the money to him, seventeen shekels of silver. I signed the deed, sealed it, got witnesses, and weighed the money on scales. Then I took the sealed deed of purchase, containing the terms and conditions, and the open copy; and I gave the deed of purchase to Baruch son of Neriah son of Mahseiah, in the presence of my cousin Hanamel, in the presence of the witnesses who signed the deed of purchase, and in the presence of all the Judeans who were sitting in the court of the guard. In their presence I charged Baruch, saying, Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Take these deeds, both this sealed deed of purchase and this open deed, and put them in an earthenware jar, in order that they may last for a long time. For thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Houses and fields and vineyards shall again be bought in this land.

The Response: Psalm 91:1-6, 14-16

1 He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High, *
abides under the shadow of the Almighty.

2 He shall say to the Lord,
"You are my refuge and my stronghold, *
my God in whom I put my trust."

3 He shall deliver you from the snare of the hunter *
and from the deadly pestilence.

4 He shall cover you with his pinions,
and you shall find refuge under his wings; *
his faithfulness shall be a shield and buckler.

5 You shall not be afraid of any terror by night, *
nor of the arrow that flies by day;

6 Of the plague that stalks in the darkness, *
nor of the sickness that lays waste at mid-day.

14 Because he is bound to me in love,
therefore will I deliver him; *
I will protect him, because he knows my Name.

15 He shall call upon me, and I will answer him; *
I am with him in trouble;
I will rescue him and bring him to honor.

16 With long life will I satisfy him, *
and show him my salvation.

The Epistle: 1 Timothy 6:6-19

There is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains.

But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time-- he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

The Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

Jesus said, "There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony. Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us.' He said, 'Then, father, I beg you to send him to my father's house-- for I have five brothers-- that he may warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment.' Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them.' He said, 'No, father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead.'"
