

The Dean's Dispatch

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 1:7b)

This verse is from the greeting of St. Paul in his letter to the congregations in Rome. I often use it to begin Morning Prayer. It is a cornerstone of my faith. I think it a good one for us all. We should all bid the grace of God for one another. It's a way of being that seems lacking in current society, where we look with suspicion upon one another as a first step. Our transactional way of life is not the way of Jesus.

So, it is good when the grace of pure generosity breaks through instead. Recently, there have been several moments of generosity and renewal of life at Trinity that I want to celebrate:

- Several parishioners stood up to assist at the Good Neighbors Warming Center we hosted last week. Joan Peyser took on additional coordinating efforts for our hosted week, in addition to her usual generosity in leading our Centering Prayer group and our renewed Lay Eucharistic Visitors program.
- This month, a donor who wishes to remain anonymous gave an additional \$100,000 toward the

construction cost of our new parish hall! What a tremendous addition to the project!

- Another donor, who likewise wishes to remain anonymous, provided their Required Minimum Distribution from retirement funds to assist in procuring the vestments and materials we need to add Vergers to our Cathedral liturgies. Vergers are lay ministers who assist the clergy in the conduct of public worship, especially in the marshaling of processions. The history of vergers dates back to the middle-ages when the verger was the "Protector of the Procession." Vergers would lead the way, making room for the procession to enter the cathedral or church from the town square. With **virge** (a form of mace) in hand they would literally clear the way if necessary. The basic vestments of the verger are a black **cassock** with a **chimere**. Virges, cassocks, and chimeres are costly and this gift is a huge help!
- Finally, we are VERY NEAR our pledge campaign minimum budget goal for 2026! Thank you all! We are only short about \$80k, which is much closer than this time last year! If you have not yet pledged out of the gifts that God has given you, please do so this week so your vestry can finish planning our finances for next year. Click here and select "Pledge Offerings" in the drop down. You can choose how much you want to give and how often (Annually, monthly, weekly, etc.) and have it drafted according to your wishes. I dream of how much we could do with more! So, I very much appreciate that over 30 households have increased their pledges in faith this year. Thank you!

Your generosity is literally building the Kingdom of God in this embassy that is Trinity Cathedral, Reno. I invite you all into adding to the great outcomes we are experiencing in our response to God's call.

Brick-by-brick we work towards the completion of Christ's Kingdom, and dollar-by-dollar we will succeed in that mission. Thank you for your faithful consideration of support. It is a profoundly important way to prepare our welcome for the Lord this Advent Season.

O come, let us adore Him!

The Canon's Corner

As we come to the closure of our sessions on community, I want to thank you for being part of this journey. I hope these reflections have sparked new ways of seeing and connecting. For our final session, I invite you to slow

down, take a walk, and simply observe.

When we move through our neighborhoods with intention, we begin to notice not just what is but also what's missing. These small observations can lead to meaningful change. For instance, if you see many people walking but nowhere to sit and connect, perhaps a local café could be encouraged to add a bench or table.

I remember walking through a town square in Italy, where men played chess, sipped coffee, children laughed, and a flower vendor brightened the scene. It felt like a movie alive with connection and joy. That memory reminds me of what's possible when public spaces are designed for gatherings.

Inspired by that, I encourage you to take three 20–30 minute walks in different parts of your neighborhood: a residential area, a commercial street, and a park or community center. Walk slowly. Observe deeply. Bring a friend if you can- two sets of eyes often see more than one.

As you walk, ask yourself:

- Who is here?
- What activities happen here?
- What joys or challenges are present?

Take notes or photos. Then reflect:

- What stood out?
- What questions do you have?
- Where might you be called to act?

Maybe you'll notice a lack of gathering spaces or wonder where local workers live. These insights can lead to small steps like suggesting outdoor seating, writing a kind note to a neighbor, or sharing your reflections with a community group.

Walking with intention helps us reconnect with our surroundings and reimagine what's possible. Each step, each observation, is a seed of transformation. May we walk with open eyes, wonder with courage, and act with love, trusting that even the smallest gesture can help shape the community we long for.

Greetings from the Finance Team!

As we approach year-end, your co-treasurers would like to clear up some confusion as to the application of pledges across years:

- 1. Your pledge will be processed when it is received and will be applied to the year it is received and processed, per IRS guidelines. That is also the year it will appear on your giving statement.
- 2. If you want your pledge applied to the church income, and to fulfil your pledge obligation for the next year, write that in the memo. <u>BUT your donation will always be on your giving statement for the year it was received and processed.</u>

For example, if you write a check in December 2025, and put in the memo "Pledge 2026", it will be applied to church income in 2026 but will be on your 2025 giving statement. If you want the amount on your 2026 giving statement, DO NOT write the check until January 1, 2026.


Divinely Fine Women December Lunch

The Collect

Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among us; and, because we are sorely hindered by our sins, let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and for ever. *Amen*.

The First Lesson: Isaiah 35:1-10 The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing.

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees.
Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear!
Here is your God.
He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense.
He will come and save you."

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveler, not even fools, shall go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

The Response: Canticle 15

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior; * for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed: * the Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name. He has mercy on those who fear him * in every generation. He has shown the strength of his arm, * he has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, * and has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, * and the rich he has sent away empty.

He has come to the help of his servant Israel, * for he has remembered his promise of mercy, The promise he made to our fathers, * to Abraham and his children for ever.

The Epistle: James 5:7-10

Be patient, therefore, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. Beloved, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! As an example of suffering and patience, beloved, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

The Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me."

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you,

who will prepare your way before you.'

"Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."
