The Dean's Dispatch

Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ is the light of the world: Grant that your people, illumined by your Word and Sacraments, may shine with the radiance of Christ's glory, that he may be known, worshipped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Collect for the Second Sunday After Epiphany)

I love the collect prayer for this coming Sunday. It is a reminder of our Anglican reformation heritage, seeking a middle way between protestant and catholic sensibilities. We are the heirs of the *English Reformation*, and we believe that both the sharing of the Word and the celebration of the Eucharist are important. We do these things together.

Be sure to come and do so this weekend, and every weekend that you can. When we meet together, something miraculous happens: Love. I see it every time a newcomer discovers that the old moniker "Frozen Chosen" doesn't apply at Trinity and that they are warmly welcome. I see it in members joining hands across political divides, affirming together the dignity of every human being. I see it in the faces of those who have something to eat and a hot cup of coffee in the morning, because our parishioners take Jesus at his word when he says we should do this for those society considers to be the least. I see it in the hard work of officers and the vestry in working to inform others of what we do to love God and our neighbors.

Like the collect above, this begins with understanding who God is through both study of the Word and consumption of the sacred Body and Blood. In doing so we become tabernacles moving through the world. Every time we leave the cathedral, we literally carry Christ out in our bodies and our minds. It's profound and beautiful.

I didn't get through nearly enough last week in my Bible Challenge forum, so we will continue this week looking at Genesis and Job. I was delighted that over 25 people came to learn more about the bible last week. I'll have more of the same handouts on hand this week. See you at the forum hour, beginning at 10am.



Jesus responds with an invitation: "Come and see."


Those three words still have the power to change everything. When we spend time with Him, something shifts. Encounters with Jesus open the door to new life, new clarity, and new purpose.

A Word from your Endowment Committee

At the start of this New Year, many of us will take the opportunity to re-evaluate our wills and trusts to ensure that those plans still reflect our wishes, desires, and current situations.

For example, events like weddings and births may prompt us to make changes in our plans; so may the acquisition or sale of property or other assets. Relocating to Nevada from another state may trigger changes. Certainly, a death or divorce may cause us to rethink and restructure our plans.

Making a bequest in your will and living trust for Trinity's Endowment Fund helps to provide a strong earthly financial future for our congregation. It also provides a powerful testimony to our family members about our priorities, stewardship, and trust in our Lord.

The following language may be helpful to your attorney should you decide to give to Trinity in this way: "I give, devise and bequeath the sum of \$(specific amount) or (X asset) to Trinity Episcopal Church, (Federal tax ID #88-0073425), a Nevada non-profit organization located at 201 Island Avenue, Reno Nevada 89501. This bequest is to be used for the benefit of the Trinity Endowment Fund."

You may also leave a percentage of your estate, or a percentage of your estate after the payment of debts. You may designate that your bequest be used to fund something specific like our music program, missions, youth program, or capital campaign.

There are some other options available to you as well, depending on your situation. These options may help you leave a bequest to Trinity and reduce your estate taxes at the same time. Since all of our situations are different, you should consult with an estate planning attorney for proper legal advice.

So as the New Year begins, remember to take some time to make sure your will and trust reflect your current situation and desires. If you have not created a will and living trust, be sure to contact an attorney who specializes in this area of the law. There is no better time than right now to make sure your earthly affairs are ordered the way you want them.

At the Diocesan Men's Retreat at Galilee, we come together as a brotherhood to tackle these questions and discuss integrating healthier approaches. For those ready to jump in, there's an invitation to flex some bench-building skills and contribute to Galilee's new Art Deck. This project will become the ultimate creative maker space for campers and adult guests. Woodcarving guru Stephen Lockert will be on hand, offering expert guidance and the tools to get the job done.

The Men's Retreat is led by **The Very Rev. Tim Watt**, Dean of Trinity Cathedral in Reno, **The Very Rev. Tim True**, Rector of Grace in the Desert and Dean of the Desert Deanery, and **Stuart Campbell**, Executive Director of Galilee. Grief Retreat

What You'll Experience:

This grief retreat, inspired by Francis Weller's *The Wild Edge of Sorrow*, offers a sacred space to honor loss, give language to what feels unspeakable, and rediscover the threads of belonging. Through guided practices, soulful ritual, and time in nature, participants are invited to lean into grief not as a problem to solve, but as a doorway into deeper connection with self, community, and the living world.

Rooted in the understanding that grief and gratitude are intertwined, the retreat creates a container where sorrow can be witnessed and shared. Together, we will explore grief in dyads, small groups, and large group circles, giving space for both intimate sharing and collective ritual. By engaging the body, imagination, and heart, this retreat opens the possibility for renewal — reminding us that grief, when tended with care, can deepen resilience, restore trust in connection, and expand our capacity to live fully.

The Lessons Appointed for Use on the Second Sunday after Epiphany



The Collect

Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ is the light of the world: Grant that your people, illumined by your Word and Sacraments, may shine with the radiance of Christ's glory, that he may be known, worshipped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The First Lesson: Isaiah 49:1-7

Listen to me, O coastlands,
pay attention, you peoples from far away!
The Lord called me before I was born,
while I was in my mother's womb he named me.
He made my mouth like a sharp sword,
in the shadow of his hand he hid me;
he made me a polished arrow,
in his quiver he hid me away.
And he said to me, "You are my servant,
Israel, in whom I will be glorified."
But I said, "I have labored in vain,
I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity;
yet surely my cause is with the Lord,
and my reward with my God."

And now the Lord says,
who formed me in the womb to be his servant,
to bring Jacob back to him,
and that Israel might be gathered to him,
for I am honored in the sight of the Lord,
and my God has become my strength--
he says,
"It is too light a thing that you should be my servant
to raise up the tribes of Jacob
and to restore the survivors of Israel;
I will give you as a light to the nations,
that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth."

Thus says the Lord,
the Redeemer of Israel and his Holy One,
to one deeply despised, abhorred by the nations,
the slave of rulers,
"Kings shall see and stand up,

princes, and they shall prostrate themselves,
because of the Lord, who is faithful,
the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you."

The Response: Psalm 40:1-12

1 I waited patiently upon the Lord; *
he stooped to me and heard my cry.

2 He lifted me out of the desolate pit, out of the mire and clay; *
he set my feet upon a high cliff and made my footing sure.

3 He put a new song in my mouth,
a song of praise to our God; *
many shall see, and stand in awe,
and put their trust in the Lord.

4 Happy are they who trust in the Lord! *
they do not resort to evil spirits or turn to false gods.

5 Great things are they that you have done, O Lord my God!
how great your wonders and your plans for us! *
there is none who can be compared with you.

6 Oh, that I could make them known and tell them! *
but they are more than I can count.

7 In sacrifice and offering you take no pleasure *
(you have given me ears to hear you);

8 Burnt-offering and sin-offering you have not required, *
and so I said, "Behold, I come.

9 In the roll of the book it is written concerning me: *
'I love to do your will, O my God;
your law is deep in my heart.'"

10 I proclaimed righteousness in the great congregation; *
behold, I did not restrain my lips;
and that, O Lord, you know.

11 Your righteousness have I not hidden in my heart;
I have spoken of your faithfulness and your deliverance; *
I have not concealed your love and faithfulness from the great congregation.

12 You are the Lord;
do not withhold your compassion from me; *
let your love and your faithfulness keep me safe for ever.

The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 1:1-9

Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and our brother Sosthenes,

To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind-- just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you-- so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Gospel: John 1:29-42

John saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God."

The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?"

He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).
